The Marthas"

Remember the story of Mary and Martha from the gospels? When Jesus was on His way to Jerusalem, He stopped at their home - they, with their brother Lazarus, were childhood friends of Jesus. By the time Jesus visited Mary and Martha in Bethany, He was already very well known as a teacher and healer. This created a bit of a problem – when our Lord came to His friends' house, He was followed by a huge multitude of people!

Jesus came into the home and sat and taught the people for a time. Mary took the opportunity to hear what Jesus had to say, and sat close to His feet in order to get every word. Martha started tending to all the guests in her home. She was cleaning, and serving, and greeting people, and ... so on. What anyone might do if a large group of visitors suddenly showed up. She started to get exhausted, and looked around for Mary so that they could divide some of the work. She was both surprised and angry to see Mary sitting on the floor in the main room. Just sitting there – not helping at all! Not doing anything!

Martha tried to make her way over to Mary, but the crowd was large and dense, and she couldn't get close enough. She didn't want to interrupt Jesus, so she was trying to be inconspicuous, but it wasn't working. Martha thought to herself, "I wish I could get close enough to tap her on the shoulder. Oh who am I kidding? What I really want to do is take her by the shoulders and shake her!" So Martha went back to serving. But it was too much - too much cleaning, not enough food, too many people. She went back into the main room again and tried again to get Mary's attention. She waved her hands and blushed when several people turned toward her, annoyed. Mary didn't notice at all.

Back to serving. One of her neighbors arrived back from the market with more food, Martha had given her money and strict instructions to hurry, but the girl got the wrong things. She went to the kitchen to see what she could do with what she had, and found that it was full of people who wanted to hear the famous Jesus of Nazareth speak.

Martha was fed up. She pushed her way back into the room where Jesus was talking and interrupted Him. "Tell Mary to come and help me. She is not doing anything, I'm doing all the work," she said to Him.

"Martha, Martha, don't worry about cleaning or about food. You need to listen to what I'm saying. Mary has done the best thing either of you could have done today."

Brothers and sisters, very often we put ourselves into the place of Martha in this story, when our busy-ness keeps us from hearing God speak. Rather, put yourself in the place of Mary. Come to church, sit at the feet of Jesus and hear His life-saving words.

The "Marthas" don't want you to do that. By "Marthas" I don't mean people, I'm referring to thoughts. They bounce around in your head and tell you that going to church is not useful. They wave their arms and tell you that you should be thinking about something other than God. They judge people around you, and they wonder about things. They remind you that you're hungry, or your feet hurt, or your back. They remind you that church is boring.

The story of Mary and Martha gives us the perfect model of spirituality, Mary of Bethany. She sat at the feet of the Lord, quiet, undistracted. Nothing could take her away from His life-saving words. She had learned to block out the distractions that her sister (and others) wanted to put upon her, and so she gained great spiritual treasures that day.

As we are in the church, let's be like Mary of Bethany. The thoughts and distractions are persistent, brothers and sisters, but with God's help we can gain the same treasure that Mary did.

Where, When and Why is it Celebrated?

Every year on October 28th there is a celebration which is celebrated in Greece called "Ohi Day". In Greek "Ohi Day" is called "I Mera tou Ohi (Η μέρα του 'Οχι)".

People celebrate it because on October 28th, 1940 the Greek President Metaxas said to the Italian President Mussolini (who was a dictator and was a friend to Hitler): "NO! I will not let you take over Greece! (OXI! Δεν θα σε αφήσω να πάρεις την Ελλάδα".

In response to Metaxas's refusal, Italian troops attacked Greece and it was the beginning of Greece's participation in Second World War.






GERASIMOS OF CEPHALONIA Sunday, October 20 8:45 am Orthros 10:00 am Divine Liturgy

Saint Gerasimus was from the Peloponnesus, the son of Demetrius and Kale, of the family of Notaras. He was reared in piety by them and studied the Sacred writings. He left his country and went throughout various lands, and finally came to Cephalonia, where he restored a certain old church and built a convent around it, where it stands to this day at the place called Omala. He finished the course of his life there in asceticism in the year 1570. His sacred relics, which remain incorrupt, are kept there for the sanctification of the faithful.

DEMETRIOS THE MYRRH-STREAMER Saturday, October 26 9:00 am Orthros 10:00 am Divine Liturgy

Saint Demetrius was a Thessalonian, a most pious son of pious and noble parents, and a teacher of the Faith of Christ. When Maximian first came to Thessalonica in 290, he raised the Saint to the rank of Duke of Thessaly. But when it was discovered that the Saint was a Christian, he was arrested and kept bound in a bath-house. While the games were under way in the city, Maximian was a spectator there. A certain friend of his, a barbarian who was a notable wrestler, Lyaeus by name, waxing haughty because of the height and strength of his body, boasted in the stadium and challenged the citizens to a contest with him. All that fought with him were defeated. Seeing this, a certain youth named Nestor, aquaintance of Demetrius', came to the Saint in the bath-house and asked his blessing to fight Lyaeus singlehanded. Receiving this blessing and sealing himself with the sign of the precious Cross, he presented himself in the stadium, and said, "O God of Demetrius, help me!" and straightway he engaged Lyaeus in combat and smote him with a mortal blow to the heart, leaving the former boaster lifeless upon the earth. Maximian was sorely grieved over this, and when he learned who was the cause of this defeat, he commanded straightway and Demetrius was pierced with lances while he was yet in the bath-house, As for Nestor, Maximian commanded that he be slain with his own sword.





PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Parish,

The Orthodox Liturgy is a time of communal prayer, a time to listen to the epistles and the gospels, a time to thank and to praise and to glorify the Lord. From the first words the priest says "Blessed is the kingdom of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit" the service proceeds to its ultimate goal of giving the congregation the opportunity to receive the sacrament, the mysterion, of the Eucharist. Growing up, I was not encouraged to receive communion very often. As a child I recall receiving it at Easter and on my name day. All these decades later I find I take it far more often. On Sunday, from the choir loft I see many parishioners who take communion every week. Many of them also receive it on the various feast days that occur during the week.

In Leviticus 17 the Lord told Moses that an animal sacrificed to God must be brought before the priest who drains the blood from the sacrifice, "and the priest shall pour the blood upon the altar all around...and whatever man...among you eats any blood, I will utterly destroy him from among his people". Well there is no ambiguity there. Fast forward to the Gospel of John, chapter 6 and we read "He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life and I will raise him up on the last day...He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood abides in Me and I in him". He said these things in the synagogue at Capernaum, and many of the Jews who heard Him and were following Him were shocked. They said "This is a hard (skliros) statement, who can listen to it". And many no longer followed Him.

And then Jesus, hearing some grumbling from His disciples says to them "Does this cause you to stumble (or does this offend you - in Greek skandalizei). Given the prohibitions of Leviticus, one can readily see how the Jews would be offended by these words. But these words, along with others in the other three gospels and in Paul's letters establish the sacrament of the Eucharist. Biblical scholars have interpreted and reinterpreted these passages for 2000 years, looking to soften them. Many Christian denominations do not even offer Holy Communion. But we do. And some, like the Jews, may be "scandalized" by the idea of a literal reading of the words.

But there they are and once again there is no ambiguity. Jesus challenged the Jews with these words. To accept His teaching, to believe in Him, the Jews had to overcome this "stumbling block", turn their backs on Leviticus, and grasp what the new covenant meant. For us, who have faith that Jesus Christ is the Pantocrator, the Son of God, who spilled His blood so that we might live, going to liturgy and receiving Holy Communion provides the opportunity for a profound and joyous connection with Him. There can be no stumbling blocks for us. We approach the chalice "With the fear of God, faith, and love", we partake of the body and blood of Christ. We should depart from the chalice with a sense of joy, gratitude, and humility. We experienced a miracle, we were immersed in God's love for us. We should, I think, appreciate that these are the most sublime moments of our "busy" lives.

Ahepa Chapter 37 is celebrating its Centennial Anniversary with a dinner dance on October 26. The Ahepa has once again become an integral part of our community, providing opportunities and events for young and not so young. The dinner is catered and the dance music will be supplied by the Aegeans. Please support the brothers of the Ahepa and join them in their celebration. The next day, October 27, after the divine Liturgy, we will have our fall General Assembly Meeting. Please remember that only parishioners of St. Sophia's who are members in good standing may vote at the meeting. To qualify as a member in good standing, you must have filled out a 2023 pledge card, fulfilled the entire pledge, and have submitted a 2024 pledge card which does not have to be paid until December 31, 2024.

Hoping to see you at the Ahepa Centennial Celebration AND the General Assembly meeting.



=>Super Plus Coffee Service - \$150 includes the following:


Philoptochos provides and serves the Pastries, coffee, milk, sugar, and juice.

The next support group starts on 11/12/24. Thus, two separate groups to ensure that interested parties can fit one into their schedule.


