THE TRIODION AND THE DEV

Enemy-occupied territory – that is what this world is. Christianity is the story of how the rightful king has landed, you might say landed in disguise, and is asking us all to take part in a great campaign of sabotage. When you go to church you go to listen to secret messages from the home country: this is why the enemy is so anxious to prevent us from going. He does it by playing on our conceit and laziness and intellectual snobbery. I know someone will ask me, "Do you really mean, in this day and age, to re-introduce our old friend the devil – hoofs and horns and all?" Well, what the day and age has to do with it I do not know. And I am not particular about the hoofs and horns. But in other respects my answer is "Yes, I do." I do not claim to know anything about his personal appearance. If anybody really wants to know him better I would say to that person, "Don't worry. If you really want to, you will. Whether you'll like it when you do is another question."


My entire first paragraph this month consists of a quotation from the book Mere Christianity by C.S.Lewis, a wonderful book. When he wrote it, just after World War II, people were starting to disregard belief in the devil as being too backward, too childish and superstitious. Lewis was a professor at Oxford, and therefore sat at the pinnacle of intellectual life and civilization in his culture, and people were a little uncomfortable with his insistence that the devil was a force to be reckoned with in Christianity. And yet, Lewis continued to write about the devil, even producing a book of fictional letters from a demon to an apprentice demon (The Screwtape Letters).

And now, here we are eighty-some years later, and there are still people who think of themselves as Orthodox Christians who do not believe in the devil. I wonder how anyone could look at the history of the world, say, from Lewis' time until now, and not detect an evil influence guiding events. Certainly, there is much to be thankful for. But there is also much that is inexplicable outside the belief/ knowledge that, every single day, human beings hand over to the devil control of the world we live in.

I think that a healthy respect for Satan's powers gives us the ability to avoid being obsessed with him. When we realize that the world is (as Lewis said) enemyoccupied territory, we are free to keep our eyes on God, and look for those moments when light defeats darkness. Our faith is not negative; however, without a negative there is no positive. In recognizing the existence of the devil, we celebrate the existence of God.

Brothers and sisters, this month we begin the Triodion, the month-long process of preparing for Lent. It is a somber time, a dark time. But remember this: the light is coming. And when it does, we will say: "At the name of Jesus every knee will bow, of those in heaven, and of those on earth, and of those under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father." Amen!

<u>Presentation of Christ in the Temple</u>

The story of the Presentation is told in Luke 2:22-29. Mary and Joseph were faithful Jews and observed their religious customs. An important custom was for the couple to take their first-born son to the Temple. The baby was taken to the Temple forty days after his birth and was dedicated to God. In addition, if the parents were wealthy, they were to bring a lamb and a young pigeon or a turtle dove to be offered as a sacrifice at the Temple. The custom provided that if the parents were poor, they were to offer two pigeons or two turtle doves for the sacrifice.

Joseph and Mary were not wealthy, so they took two turtle doves with them to offer as a sacrifice at the *Temple*.

When Jesus was forty days old, Mary and Joseph took Him to the Temple in Jerusalem. They were not wealthy, so they took two turtle doves with them to offer as a sacrifice at the Temple. As they arrived at the Temple, Mary and Joseph were met by a very old man named Simeon. He was a holy man and was noted as a very intelligent scholar. Simeon spent much time studying about the prophets of Israel. It was during his studies that he learned of the coming of the Messiah. The Jewish people were waiting for the Messiah to come and deliver Israel from their conquerors. From that time on, Simeon spent his time praying for the Messiah to come. He spent many years in prayer. Finally, while Simeon was praying he heard the voice of God. God promised Simeon that he would not die until he had seen the Messiah. When Simeon saw Jesus, he took the baby in his arms and blessed the Lord and said:

"Lord, now let Your servant go in peace according to Your promise, because my eyes have seen Your salvation which you have prepared before the face of all peoples, a light to bring revelation to the Gentiles, and the glory to your people Israel."

Simeon took Jesus in his arms and praised God. Also, in the Temple was Anna the Prophetess. She had been a widow for many years. Anna was about eighty-four years old and spent her time in the Temple worshiping, fasting, and praying. When she saw the Christ Child she praised God and spoke of him to all who were awaiting the Messiah. After Jesus was presented in the Temple, the family returned to Galilee to the town of Nazareth. The Bible tells us that Jesus grew and became strong, and was filled with wisdom.

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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

"Blessed is the kingdom of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit". With these words the priest begins every Divine Liturgy. What follows (at St Sophia's) is a ritualized celebration that lasts about an hour. Now sometimes it takes more time due to memorials, special religious days, Christmas pageants. But the Liturgy takes an hour.

How long does a football, basketball, hockey game take? More than an hour. How hard do we try to be there when the game starts? We race to be there. If we are actually going to the game or say a concert, we plan ahead. We anticipate delays and we curse the traffic jam that messes up those plans. Why?

Attending these events is a high priority for us. We look forward to attending. They are exciting, they give us great pleasure. And we cannot wait to go to the next event.

When it comes to the Divine Liturgy, many people do not see the need to hear those first words the priest intones: "Blessed is the Kingdom of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit". It's ok to be late. So think about it for a second or two. We race to all these secular events to be there at the beginning. We look forward to going to the point that we juggle our schedules to not miss one.

And the more we know about the game or music or whatever, the more satisfying our experience is. You know the rules, you know the music. You do not merely attend. You participate at a very high level with all that is going on. All performed by fellow mortals who provide entertainment, mental diversions, even, for many, joy.

What about the Liturgy? Well we believe that God Himself is there every time. The Holy Spirit changes the wine into the blood of Christ and the bread into his body. Jesus tells us in Luke and John that this is my body and this is my blood. Do this in remembrance of me. Orthodox Christians believe that this transformation actually occurs. We participate in the mystery of the Holy Eucharist.

During the Divine Liturgy God is in the church offering us the way to salvation. He is there every time. I venture to say that God's presence in the church should be the most compelling reason for us to attend the liturgy above all other events in our lives. And, I will add, to be there for that invocation "Blessed is the kingdom of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit".

I want to congratulate AHEPA and Philoptochos for sponsoring the January dance. It was a joyful event. The Ioannidis family (Garden View Diner) provided a terrific meal which everyone really enjoyed. The Aegeans did their thing and a great time was had by all.

The sound system, I have been told, will be installed in mid February. There was a delay in the delivery of the speakers. I will keep you informed of any changes.

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
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Shut-In & **Hospital Visitations**





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
